In the audience was the FBI agent working the case, Cecil Moses, along with a former Morgan County Deputy Sheriff, JW Bradley, who worked at the jail when Billy escaped.

From Producer/Director Scott Rabideau: "Despite Billy's wild life of crime, what really drew me to this story was his creative drive. I couldn't imagine living in a cave for this long — surviving, writing, and painting while the FBI was conducting a nationwide manhunt. It was fascinating he chose to be creative at all, to use his artwork as a tool to communicate with friends and loved ones when he was in hiding. For me, the film is about the power of art to pull you out of your darkest moments, and I think it did that for Billy. From the words in his journal and the images he produced in the cave, I see a conflicted human being striving to get back to his true self."
